Subject: Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund Due Diligence Review

This letter supersedes Finance's original LMIHF DDR determination letter dated November 21, 2012. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code (HSC) section 34179.6 (c), the Agoura Hills Redevelopment Successor Agency (Agency) submitted an oversight board approved Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund (LMIHF) Due Diligence Review (DDR) to the California Department of Finance (Finance) on November 2, 2012. Finance issued a LMIHF DDR determination letter on November 21, 2012. Subsequently, the Agency requested a Meet and Confer session on one or more items adjusted by Finance. The Meet and Confer Session was held on December 7, 2012.

Based on a review of additional or clarifying information provided to Finance during the Meet and Confer process, Finance continues to believe the adjustments made to the DDR's stated balance of LMIHF available for distribution to the taxing entities is appropriate. HSC section 34179.6 (d) authorizes Finance to make these adjustments. We maintain the adjustments continue to be necessary for the following reason(s):

- The Agency contends the retention of current balances is necessary for the purpose of meeting future debt service obligations and administrative expenses. Finance originally denied the Agency's request to retain \$973,457 due to a lack of evidence there would be insufficient property taxes to pay future obligations.

During the Meet and Confer process, the Agency provided additional information including a projection of annual revenue and spending requirements. The cash flow analysis contemplates the repayment of city loans or agreements. Should these items become enforceable obligations after a Finding of Completion is received from Finance, the repayment of these obligations is restricted to any residual pass-through payments pursuant to HSC section 34191.4 (b) (2) (A) and should not contribute to any cash flow issues.

The cash flow analysis does not indicate the Agency has an immediate need to retain the LMIHF for housing obligations or bond debt service payments. Therefore, Finance deems it not necessary for the Agency to retain the requested funds.

However, should this adjustment cause a cash flow shortage for administrative expenses, HSC provides successor agencies with various methods to address short term cash flow issues. These may include refinancing debt pursuant to HSC section 34177.5 (a), requesting a loan from the city pursuant to HSC section 34173 (h), or accumulating reserves for future obligations when a future balloon or uneven payment is expected. The Agency should seek counsel from their oversight board to determine the solution most appropriate for their situation.

Since the cash flow analysis does not fully support the immediate need to retain LMIHF balances and there are alternatives available to address potential short term cash flow issues, Finance deems it is not necessary for Agency to retain the requested funds.

The Agency's LMIHF balance available for distribution to the affected taxing entities continues to be \$2,026,166 (see table below).

This is Finance's final determination of the LMIHF balances available for distribution to the taxing entities. HSC section 34179.6 (f) requires successor agencies to transmit to the county auditor-controller the amount of funds identified in the above table within five working days, plus any interest those sums accumulated while in the possession of the recipient.

If funds identified for transmission are in the possession of the successor agency, and if the successor agency is operated by the city or county that created the former redevelopment agency, then failure to transmit the identified funds may result in offsets to the city's or the county's sales and use tax allocation, as well as its property tax allocation. If funds identified for transmission are in the possession of another taxing entity, the successor agency is required to take diligent efforts to recover such funds. A failure to recover and remit those funds may result in offsets to the other taxing entity's sales and use tax allocation or to its property tax allocation. If funds identified for transmission are in the possession of a private entity, HSC 34179.6 (h) (1) (B) states that any remittance related to unallowable transfers to a private party may also be subject to a 10 percent penalty if not remitted within 60 days.


Failure to transmit the identified funds will also prevent the Agency from being able to receive a finding of completion from Finance. Without a finding of completion, the Agency will be unable to take advantage of the provisions detailed in HSC section 34191.4. Specifically, these provisions allow certain loan agreements between the former redevelopment agency (RDA) and the city, county, or city and county that created the RDA to be considered enforceable obligations. These provisions also allow certain bond proceeds to be used for the purposes in which they were sold and allows for the transfer of real property and interests into the Community Redevelopment Property Trust Fund once Finance approves the Agency's long-range property management plan.

In addition to the consequences above, willful failure to return assets that were deemed an unallowable transfer or failure to remit the funds identified above could expose certain individuals to criminal penalties under existing law.

Pursuant to HSC section 34167.5 and 34178.8, the California State Controller's Office (Controller) has the authority to claw back assets that were inappropriately transferred to the city, county, or any other public agency. Determinations outlined in this letter and Finance's Housing Assets Transfer letter dated August 23, 2012 do not in any way eliminate the Controller's authority.
